# GWMWater

2018 water price review | Final decision



Customer fact sheet

In June 2018 the Essential Services Commission released its final decision on GWMWater's price submission. The final decision completes our review of the maximum prices that GWMWater may charge for its services for a five year regulatory period from 1 July 2018 to 30 June 2023.


We undertook this review under our new pricing framework that helps promote better value and outcomes for water customers. As part of this process, water businesses sent us submissions on their proposed prices and key outcomes. We assessed proposals against a legal framework established by the Victorian Government. We sought feedback from customers at multiple points throughout the price review process to inform our decision making in an open and consultative manner.

## What are the changes to prices and tariffs?

Overall prices for GWMWater urban customers will **go down**, while prices for rural customers will **rise no more than inflation** (on average). GWMWater will increase the recreation contribution charge to \$18 (concession \$9) to extend discounts to schools. The Recreation Lake Water charge will increase from \$20 to \$25 per megalitre, not including inflation

GWMWater will retain a two-part tariff structure for residential and non-residential water services with a fixed service charge and a variable component that depends on water use. For residential and nonresidential urban sewerage services, it will retain a fixed service charge only.

## How will this affect your bill?

Prices and tariffs are only part of the bill. Your actual bill depends on factors such as the amount of water and services you use. Estimated bills are provided below.

Bills are indicative. 2018-19 annual bills include inflation. 2022-23 annual bills will vary with inflation.

## **Outcomes for customers**

As part of its price submission, GWMWater consulted with customers to develop a set of outcomes to guide service delivery during 2018 to 2023. During this consultation it identified three outcomes as well as measures and targets to monitor how it performs in delivering these outcomes.

Some of the ways GWMWater plans to improve value for customers include extending digital metering to urban customers, introducing a town sewer scheme for Goroke and providing access to drinking water in Kaniva, Moyston, Ultima and Elmhurst.



In response to feedback from customers, GWMWater has introduced a Guaranteed Service Level for water quality and committed to carting water to rural households where water supply is interrupted for more than 72 hours. Service levels for reliability and attending faults will be similar to past years.

## What are the major works that will go on around you?

## How much revenue is required from 2018 to 2023?\*

Our final decision for GWMWater allows operating expenditure of **\$167 million** and gross capital expenditure of **\$88 million** to provide its services to customers over the next five years. To fund this GWMWater requires **\$317 million in revenue**, an **increase** from the \$310 million required during 2013 to 2018.

This additional revenue will not increases prices in the next five years because of growth in population and the efficiencies GWMWater plans to make.
