Other fees and charges

It seems inconsistent to want consumers to install and develop solar technologies for their homes,

then greatly reduce the sola feed-in tariff. The ROI for a solar system should be aimed at 7-8

years, with the reduction in feed-in rates this make less sense economically.

That said, I noticed some providers have now started charging over \$1 per day for service charges

and I believe this should be capped by the government in range. We have moved to a provider that

charges half this amount.

The social cost of carbon

The idea would be to incentivise consumers to install solar + battery systems in their homes.

Scrap the ability for council to not allow panels to face the street, allow better ROI for consumers or

greatly reduce rates, service charges for consumers that have either or installed.

Are there any other matters relevant to the review we should consider?

Let consumers in 2-3 years in advance of significant changes, i.e. tariff changes so they can plan

solar system installs.

The future would be to have all Victorian households having at least 3kW solar systems, which
