



Greater Metropolitan Water Price Review Yarra Valley Water: Final decision outcomes for 2013-14 to 2017-18 June 2013




The ESC's final decision has approved a reduction of Yarra Valley Water's proposed costs of 7.4% (or \$367 million) over the five years from 2013-14**.






Prices*

The ESC's final decision has approved an increase in average prices of 24.6% over the five years from 2013-14**.








Price changes from 2012-13

Indicative household bills (owner-occupier)*

The ESC's final decision has approved that over the next five years, indicative Yarra Valley Water household bills would be reduced by \$664**.



*Indicative bills are based on consumption for owner-occupier households.

All numbers presented here are in 2012-13 dollars and do not include future inflation, with the exception of household bills.

** All comparisons are against businesses' Water Plan proposals. Illustrative bills for Yarra Valley Water are based on average consumption of 155kL per annum.

Key Final Decision Outcomes

Expenditure

Operating Expenditure

- In it final decision, the Commission has adopted operating expenditure of \$3.4 billion.
- This is \$200.7 million (5.6 per cent) lower than the proposed expenditure of \$3.6 billion.

Capital Expenditure

- Yarra Valley Water proposed capital expenditure of \$1.15 billion.
- There is no adjustments in the Commission's draft decision; approved capital expenditure of \$1.15 billion.

Tariffs

Retail Water Tariffs

- Yarra Valley Water proposed to maintain a three tier inclining block tariff.
- Yarra Valley Water currently charges \$1.78 per kilolitre for the first tier water price.
- From 2013-14, it proposed to charge \$2.66 increasing with inflation to 2017-18.
- In its final decision, the Commission has approved the price structure of residential and non-residential retail water tariffs proposed by Yarra Valley Water.
- The Commission has approved a revenue cap form of price control.

Sewerage Tariffs

- Yarra Valley Water proposed to maintain a two part tariff structure a fixed component and a variable component for residential and non-residential sewerage tariffs. proposed to move from a per property sewerage charge to a per connection charge.
- The Commission has approved Yarra Valley Water's proposal to maintain existing tariff structures for residential and non-residential sewerage services.

Customer Support

- The Commission continues to emphasise the importance of water retailers ensuring customers experiencing hardship receive assistance and treated fairly.
- The water retailers, Victorian Government and Commonwealth Government provide a range of programs to assist customers experiencing financial hardship.
- In its final decision, the Commission has allowed allow an additional \$2 million for Yarra Valley Water to assist low income and vulnerable customers in managing the impact of the proposed price increases.
- We will monitor implementation of measures to assist customers experiencing hardship and report on our findings in our annual performance reports.
