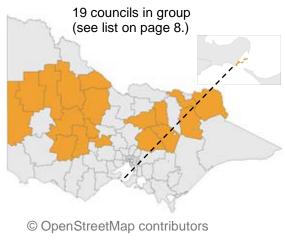


Small shire council group

This fact sheet uses graphs and data to examine revenue, expenditure and financial sustainability for the small shire group of councils over recent years.

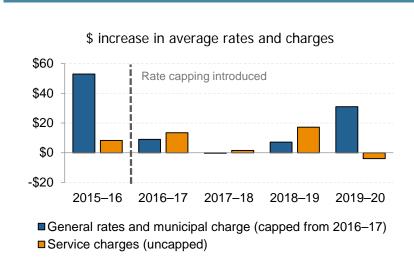

Distribution of rates increases and decreases

The applicable rate cap is applied to each council's average rate, which means some individual rates increased by more and some increased by less than the applicable cap (or even decreased).

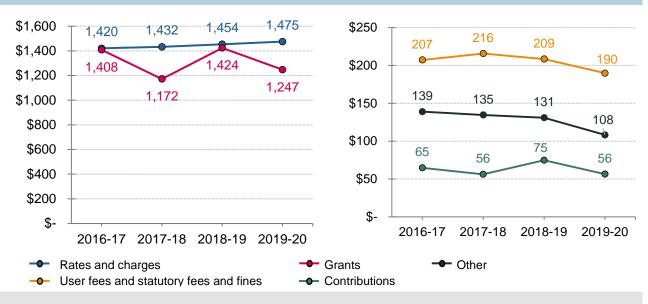

In real terms, the small shire council group's average total revenue fluctuated between 2016–17 and 2019–20, largely reflecting changes in revenue from grants including an advance payment of Commonwealth financial assistance grants in 2016–17, and the receipt of regional improvement and natural disaster grants in 2018–19.

Rates and charges, and grants were the largest sources of revenue for the group, and together these sources accounted for 87 per cent of total revenue between 2016–17 and 2019–20.

Revenue per person (2019–20 dollars)



In terms of revenue per person (which adjusts for population growth), revenue from grants fluctuated in real terms between 2016–17 and 2019–20. This compares with an upward trend in revenue per person from rates and charges.

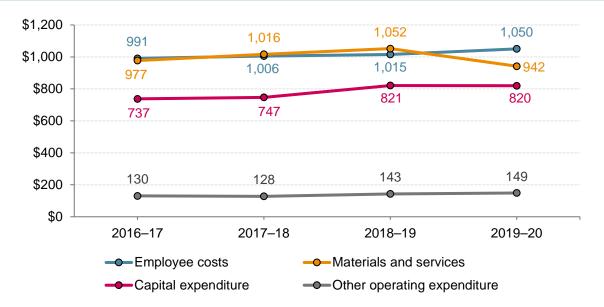

In real terms, the small shire council group's average total expenditure increased between 2016–17 and 2019–20, particularly capital expenditure in 2018–19 and 2019–20. Expenditure on materials and services increased in real terms between 2016–17 and 2018–19 before decreasing in 2019–20. Employee costs and 'other operating expenditure' trended upwards between 2016–17 and 2019–20.

Employee costs was the group's largest area of expenditure, accounting for 35 per cent of total expenditure between 2016–17 and 2019–20.

Expenditure per person (2019–20 dollars)



In terms of expenditure per person (which adjusts for population growth), all areas of the small shire council group's expenditure (except materials and services) trended upwards between 2016–17 and 2019–20. Expenditure per person on materials and services increased in real terms between 2016–17 and 2018–19 before decreasing in 2019–20.

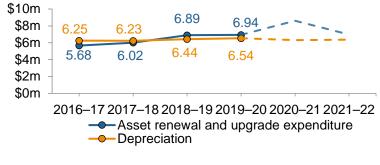

In real terms, the small shire council group's average spending on asset renewal and asset upgrades trended upwards between 2016–17 and 2019–20, with a decrease in asset renewal in 2019–20. Spending on asset expansion trended downwards over this time, while there was a drop in spending on new assets from 2017–18.

Asset renewal remained the highest share of capital expenditure between 2016–17 and 2019–20, (accounting for 56 to 63 per cent of total capital expenditure).

Average spending by councils in the small shire group on the renewal and upgrade of assets trended upwards in real terms between 2016–17 and 2019–20. This spending increased above the amount of depreciation (the decline in value of council's assets caused by age and use) from 2018–19.

Renewal and upgrade expenditure was forecast to remain above 100 per cent of depreciation in 2020–21 and 2021–22.



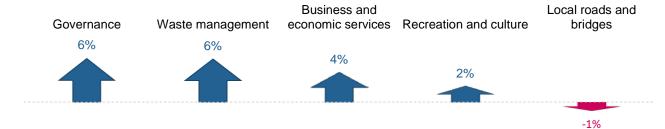

Average expenditure by function (2019–20 \$m and % of total services expenditure)

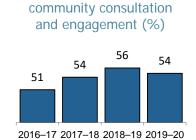

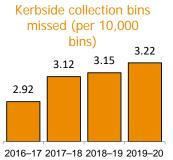
Has there been a change in service quality and community satisfaction?

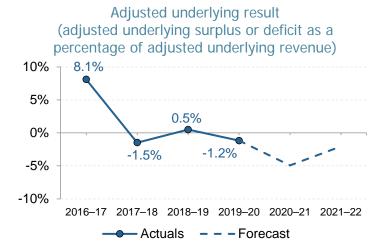

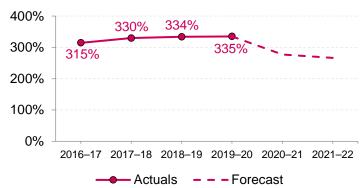


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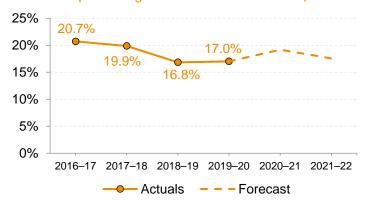
Are councils in the small shire group operating sustainably?

Between 2016–17 and 2019–20, the small shire council group had an average adjusted underlying result of 1.5 per cent.

The small shire council group had an average working capital ratio of 328 per cent between 2016–17 and 2019–20.

Between 2016–17 and 2019–20, the small shire council group had an average indebtedness ratio of 18.6 per cent.

Note: Some of the year-on-year change in the adjusted underlying result and the working capital ratio may be due to the timing of Commonwealth grant payments.
